An arts-based SEN work experience project

A unique opportunity for 12 SEN young people to work with the founders of Make/Sense Theatre, a Reading based theatre company working with the neurodivergent community, to develop workplace skills and promote disability awareness through drama.

The All Work and One Play work experience project was inspired by When This Is Over, a play devised by Make/Sense's SEN young company - from their life stories of being a neurodivergent person navigating a neurotypical world - being performed again at South St Arts Centre, Reading this April.

Twelve young people will work together to create a professionally produced short film using their stories and talent -both behind and in front of the camera.

What will happen each week during the project?

We will form a theatre company for the duration of the project with participants required to wear a uniform and follow the rules and routines of a professional company in a friendly and safe environment.

In addition to fun, confidence and communication building drama exercises, group and independent tasks will be completed each week to reach our final goal of creating and sharing an original film. At the end of the project the participants will have created a short film to be given to their schools to share with current and potential work experience employers. Its first showing will be at an event (also organised by the participants) at South St on the last week of the project to an invited audience of staff, family and employers.

The aim is to develop workplace and life skills through drama, but also to promote disability awareness through this film so that work experience employers will have a greater understanding of the needs and abilities of young SEN people in the workplace.

If you believe you have one or two young people at your school who would benefit from this work experience project then we would ideally like them to see our show, When This is Over, at South St Arts Centre on April 5th at 11am so that they have an understanding of the roots and purpose of the All Work and One Play project.
